

#### **OUR ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN THE YEAR 2014-2015**

The year 2014-2015 had been no different for FAsCE India, the Social Action Initiative of the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales (MSFS), Northeast India Province, in terms of its ardent journey in promoting progress in the lives of Children, Youth, Men and Women across Northeast India. FAsCE India was able to script innumerable stories of positive, progressive and promotive transformation among its target groups. Through its Integrated Community Development Programmes and Community Based Rehabilitation for Persons with Disabilities, the organisation was able to touch the lives of many a Children, Youth, Men, Women and Disabled throughout the region. This annual report is an attempt to explicitly unveil before you our accomplishments during past one year.

#### 1. PROMOTION OF CHILD RIGHTS

From the inception, one of the major focuses of FAsCE India was promotion of Child Rights. Towards this effect a number of programmes are implemented in different centres to ensure safer living conditions for children, to educate them and their parents on their rights and duties and making their voices heard. Northeast India, with its complexity of problems and increasing number of child trafficking cases and untraced missing children, needs special attention and action plan for the welfare and protection of children. Some of the activities successfully implemented to this effect are formation of Children's Parliaments in villages, Child Right Clubs in schools, awareness programmes for the teachers, parents and civil society leaders on Child Rights, elimination of Child Labour in Tea Estates, ToT on the prevention of child sexual abuse and Child Right violations through human resource development, training of resident counselors in the schools, etc.

#### 1.1. Focussed on reduction of child labour and youth unemployment

The project, 'Integrated community development with special focus to reduction of child labour and youth unemployment issues in three tea gardens of Dhubri District, Assam,' that saw light of the day as a continuation of the Child Right Advocacy Project arrived its successful completion during the reporting period nourishing the lives of several children, youth, women and men in the





community. They benefited immensely by the project. Twenty one tuition centres in 21 villages of the tea gardens create a strong sense of Right to Education among common folk. Almost 60 children who were either idle at home or working elsewhere were brought together under the umbrella of right to Basic Education Act. The activity of forming Children's Parliament and gathering them for meetings and taking for demanding various rights of common people gave more confidence and push for growth and development. The members of CP exhibited greater confidence at the completion of the project that they could take common issues to higher authorities and get the things done. FAsCE remains ever grateful to Andheri Hilfe Bonn, Germany, in accomplishing the project.

#### **Achievements:**

**Supplementary Tuition Centres:** Twenty one supplementary tuition centres have been created in the target villages for the better performance of children in their studies, specially focussing on the dropout students.

**Parents Managing Committee (PMC):** Twenty one PMCs have been formed in ten target villages (where the tuition centres exist) to protect the rights of children.

**Child Rights Club:** Four child rights clubs have been created in the target area for better realization of the rights of children.

**Children's Parliament:** Four children's parliaments have been formed for the children to deal with their own small problems. Nearly 120 children are directly involved in the CP.

**Children's Federation:** Three children's federations have been formed.

**Self Help Groups:** New SHGs are formed to shape and change their economical status and keep their sense of unity.

**English Spoken Course:** Seventy four youth were imparted English spoken course to help them in their studies and stay in good stead for better jobs.

**Computer Literacy Course:** Forty two youth completed basic course in computer know-how.

**Leadership Training:** Teachers of government and private schools were trained in leadership skills and imparted with knowledge of child rights.

#### **Embracing the storehouse of knowledge again**

I am Josephina Tirkey, studying in Class XI and hailing from Krishnakali Tea Estate, Dubri district, Assam. I had dropped out of school three years back due financial struggles at home. I was working as housemaid in one of the houses in Bahalpur. Whenever time permitted, I used to attend the meetings conducted by FAsCE India in the village. FAsCE India staff once or twice briefed me about the need to continue education leaving behind the then temporary work. I took the matter to my parents, which they did not approve. But I took a firm decision to leave the work and with the help of FAsCE India I joined back to Dolmara Government School. I passed Class X last year and am pursuing Class XI now. Million thanks to FAsCE India for ensuring a safer future for me.

#### 1.2. Formation of Children's Parliaments

The concept of 'Children's Parliament' is based on 'Children's Right to participation' enshrined in the UN convention and ratified by India. It trains children to participate in the development of the village, particularly the children of the neighbourhood where they live. The success they achieve in improving the village as children makes them grow into participating, responsible citizens. They grow into citizens who will participate in the 'Nation Building Project'.

During the reporting period, FAsCE India successfully formed 60 Children's Parliaments covering 2000 children in Assam. The project was implemented in 15 villages of Jonai and Telam in Dhemaji District, and Hamren in Karbi Anglong District.

Children's Parliament is an effective tool, especially in developing the talents and skills of good governance and leadership among children. We express our sincere thanks to the Diocese of FREIBURG, Germany, for their generous financial support in this endeavour.








#### 1.3. Providing safe drinking water to school children

The construction of a 10,000 Lt water tank (plumbing and motor installation included) is being initiated at SFS School, Yingkiong, Upper Siang District, Arunachal Pradesh. The project is an immense blessing to over 200 school children and around 80 boarders, providing them with clean, safe and sufficient water to drink and equipping also the school with one of its basic needs. Day scholars are saved from the drudgery of carrying water to the school and hostellers and staff members have enough water for their needs, not having to go to jungle streams any more.



#### 1.4. Providing Quality Residential Education to Tribal Children



FAsCE India, working for the rights of children, has always tried to realise their Right to Education, especially in remote villages of Northeast India. The initiation of the new project: 'Providing Quality Residential Education to Tribal Children from Umwahlang and surrounding Villages in West Khasi Hills District, Meghalaya' is yet another bold step taken by FAsCE India to provide quality education along with sound formation and skills to poor tribal children of inaccessible areas of Northeast India. The site levelling of the proposed Boys' Home is in progress and the

construction of it is being initiated. This new project will mould many young tribal boys into dutiful citizens who will sincerely work hard for the improvement of their village and surroundings. It will also create many change makers who will transform remote tribal villages and tribal population to voice their rights and lead a dignified life. We thank Fr Mathai Ottappally (Städtchenstrasse 66, CH - 7320 Sargans, Switzerland) who raise fund for this noble project that will bring sunshine on many faces of children.



#### 1.5. FEAF: Empowering children... transforming lives...

In continuance of its efforts to empower children and youth by providing education assistance to economically weak students of Northeast India, FAsCE India has distributed its scholarships for the year under its initiative, FEAF (FAsCE Education Assistance Fund). Through this programme FAsCE India provides scholarships to underprivileged students, both at school level and for professional courses, with its conviction that the best way of helping to make a poor family self-reliant is to help the students in that family to have access to quality education. Accordingly FAsCE India provided 70 students from different centres with financial assistance to pursue their studies.



#### 2. INTEGRATED RURAL DEVELOPMENT AND WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

#### 2.1. ISCD in seven villages and three tea gardens of Dhubri District, Assam

Integrated Sustainable Community Development (ISCD) in seven villages and three tea gardens of Dhubri District, Assam, is yet another developmental project initiated by FAsCE India with financial support from Manos Unidas during the reporting period. Aimed at covering 2350 women and their families in two years' time, the project has made big headway in creating an impact among the beneficiaries. The programmes under the project revolves around the participant women and their capacity building at five levels of empowerment, such as Organisaton, Education, Health, Savings & Credit, Income Generation. Since the project was planned including all the stakeholders in the locality, they participated whole heartedly in all the activities. Major Interventions during the first year (June 2014 – May 2015) was dissemination of information on Self Help Groups, formation of Self Help Groups, capacity building of their leaders, awareness on a number of issues and training on Income Generating Activities.

Income Generation Activities	100 SHG women were trained in candle making, kitchen garden and animal husbandry.

#### 2.2. Integrated village development project at Manikbond, Assam

Seva Kendra Manikbond, the zonal office of FAsCE India, is playing a vital role for the development of Lowairpoa Block under Karimganj District, Assam, through the Integrated Village Development Project with the assistance of AIFO Italy. The project mainly focuses on health, education, vocational training and women empowerment.

Health	St Joseph's Community Health Centre is providing medical care to the patients of eight Sub centres under NRHM project. Around 4000 people benefited of this health service during the reporting period.
Education	18 supplementary education centres render primary level educational assistance to more than 600 students.
Vocational Training	Job oriented training programmes, like tailoring and knitting are being conducted.
Women Empowerment	Seva Kendra Manikbond takes concrete steps to reactivate the existing SHGs. 20 SHGs have been re-activated during the reporting period.
	A three-day women federation workshop was organised for the SHG members and leaders to form federations.
	Launched three federations of SHGs.

#### 2.3. ICDP in Thingba Khunou and Thingba Khullen Villages of Manipur

With the goal of improving the living conditions of poor tribal women in Thingba Khunou and Thingba Khullen villages of Senapathi District, Manipur, through a five-level empowerment, namely organisaton, education, health, savings & credit, and income generation, FAsCE India in collaboration with Stiftung Maria Theresia Scherer, Switzerland, launched a two-year project of Integrated Community Development since June 2014. When the first phase was over the initiative had formed 15 Self Help Groups covering 210 women.





Programmes	Results
Training on Self Help Groups	Six trainings were organised on topics like objectives & concept of SHG, Rules and Bye law, Book keeping & Accounting, and how to tackle socio- economic issues.
	200 members benefited from the training.
	Fifteen SHGs were formed.
Health Awareness Programmes	Four health awareness programmes were organised on maternal health and child care, sex education for teenage girls, personal hygiene and sanitation, balance diet and nutrition, communicable diseases and prevention, use of Herbal Medicine etc.
	A total of 200 women and teenager girls attended the programme.
Training on leadership	150 women participated in the four leadership training programmes.
Legal awareness programme	180 women participated in the legal awareness programmes on topics like atrocities and violence against women, women rights, child and women trafficking, RTE (Right to Education), RTI (Right to Information), and RTF (Right to Food).
Alternative Livelihood Programme	Income generating activities initiated for 100 women on pig rearing, poultry, and organic farming. The SHG members were trained in vermicompost making, organic pest and disease management by Department of Agriculture, Manipur.



#### Other accomplishments

Farmers' club was formed to address their issues collectively to local administration.

All the 15 SHGs are registered under the Block, DRDA (District Rural Development Agency) and NABARD. All the days of national and international importance celebrated.





The Integrated Community Development programme in Thingba Khunou and Thingba Khullen villages of Manipur is making huge progress in and through the successful implementation of its various components. It has played a vital role in touching the lives of the poor and bringing about an overall development, especially by addressing their needs and struggles.

## 2.4. Community development through women empowerment at Somonpara, Meghalaya

Taking into consideration the multiple roles played by women in the society and how important it is to empower them for an integrated development of communities, FAsCE India initiated the pilot project of formation of SHGs and promotion of livelihood in 10 villages of Somonpara, Garo Hills, Meghalaya. In order to capacitate the newly elected SHG Leaders, a project orientation cum training was organized on July 4 - 5, 2014, at FAsCE Office, Somonpara. Miss Kapila Marak (Popi), the training Coordinator of Mahila Shakti Kendra (MASK) Balipara, Assam, was the main resource person.

Project orientation cum training	60 persons benefitted of the three-day programme.
Formation of SHGs	15 SHGs consisting of 158 members were formed.
Training in Income Generation activities	40 men and women were trained in Rosary making, candle making and flower making.

#### 2.5. Relief support for flood affected families of Slums in Narengi-Satgaon, Assam

FAsCE India provided relief support to 260 flood affected families in the slums of Satgaon - Narengi, Guwahati, on Dec 7, 2014. The long queue before the registration counter with the given slip in their hands at FAsCE India Head Office that day spread an air of joy, consolation and respite emanating from the hearts of people gathered to receive the relief kits. Each relief kit contained woollen blanket, mosquito net, bleaching powder, detergents and study materials including note books. The kits reflected an answer to the genuine needs of the people emerging from a month long survey and analysis done by FAsCE India with the help of MSW interns from Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS), Guwahati.

A total of 260 families from the aforementioned slums, who were left in the lurch after the floods losing their valuable belongings of basic necessity, received relief kits provided by FAsCE India with the financial support from MANOS UNIDAS, Spain.

#### 2.6. Leadership training for community leaders

With the financial assistance of Koch foundation, USA, FAsCE India organised three-day training on 'Leadership' for community leaders at St Joseph's School, Kaying, West Siang Dt, Arunachal Pradesh, from Nov 13-16, 2014. Seventy one persons from across three Siang districts (East, West and Upper) of Arunachal Pradesh participated in the program.





A team of experts in leadership animated the participants on different themes intended at enabling them to be transformational leaders in the 21st century. Implementing the project was a great achievement in capacitating the community leaders of Arunachal Pradesh.

#### 3. VOCATIONAL TRAINING OF YOUTH

#### 3.1. Skill training and career assistance for school dropout youth at Hamren

FAsCE India, in collaboration with FVTRS Bangalore, executed a Skill Training Project comprising of three trades: Tailoring, Bamboo Craft and Food Processing, in order to skill the unemployed school dropout youth of Hamren, Karbi Anglong, Assam. Through the project, the organisation trained 40 girls in garment making, 35 girls and 10 boys in bamboo craft and 30 girls in food processing, all in seven different batches. A total of 36 of them are employed in garment making, 35 in bamboo craft and 23 in food processing, earning enough for a decent living.

#### Bamboo for Life

We are ten young men namely Augustine Kro, Petrus Teron, Francis Teron, Philip Kro, Augustine Teron, Joseph Kro, Sarthe Engti, Welson Rongpi, David Rongpi and Thomas Teron. We are the first batch of bamboo craft training organized by FAsCE India with the support of FVTRS, in our village. We are from Lumta village, which is very interior without roads, transport and



communication. It is surrounded by forest. But we have plenty of bamboos in and around our village. FAsCE India team visited our village and suggested that there was an opportunity for the dropout youth to be trained in Bamboo Craft. We welcomed the idea happily and promised our collaboration. Our village head man encouraged us to join the training. Though we were surrounded by bamboos, we never knew that it could provide us with income. Though we knew how to make Bamboo mats, they were crude and not according to the standard, properly processed and scientifically prepared. It fetched very little price. The training gave us new impetus, knowledge and skills that could fetch good income. We learned the proper methods. We realized that we have inherent skills and are useful people. Now our product has demand and buyers. Even the middle men are approaching us to buy them in bulk to supply it to the ply wood factories in the city. But FAsCE India is asking us to form cooperatives that can bring us better price and increase our bargaining capacities. We like the idea and our Coordinator has offered us support in this venture. Our earnings have improved now. We have steady income. We are earning an average income of Rs 4000/- per month. It is something innovative and a big achievement compared to our standard. More than this we have courage and hope that we have a good life ahead utilizing the resources that are around us. Million thanks to FAsCE India for coming to our aid.



#### 3.2. Skill training and employment promotion at Diphu for school dropout youth

In collaboration with Raskob Foundation, USA, FAsCE India initiated the project of multi skill training and employment promotion for 50 school dropout tribal youth at Diphu, Karbi Anglong District, Assam. Aimed at training 30 boys and 20 girls in multi skills such as welding, carpentry, assembling solar lanterns and book binding, the project is expected to assist each trainee to procure a job or self-employment. The project will enhance the skills of the school dropouts in the area and enable them to stand on their own.









#### 4. PEACE INTERVENTION ACTIVITIES

#### 4.1. ICDP in 10 villages of Dhubri district, Assam

Integrated Community Development Programme in ten villages of Dhubri district, Assam - a project initiated by FAsCE India with financial support from Mensen met een Missie in January 2014 - took on a successful implementation during the reporting period bringing about enormous social changes and immense benefits in the life of the beneficiaries. As a project launched in the aftermath of Bodo-Muslim 2012 ethnic violence, it was of huge respite to both the communities. FAsCE India's timely intervention through trauma counseling, rehabilitation, dialogue initiation at various levels, creation of peace clubs and committees, recreational activities, etc. has borne fruits in abundance promoting peace, progress and prosperity among the target population.





#### **Accomplishments:**

- Local communities gather very often for meetings, to discuss the life progress and problems of the neighbourhood. Unity, sharing spirit and common interest for peaceful neighbourhood has been strengthened.
- There is a strong social mobilization force moving towards sustainable peace in the target areas by children (peace club members), adults (peace committee members) and women (SHG members).
- ♦ More involvement of the local political leaders in blocking ethnic, communal and political violence. Consultation of political leaders to the NGO and the CBO in developmental issues.
- Better realization of the rights of the common people, especially in the field of education, economy, Right to Information, Right to Safe Drinking water etc.
- ♦ Men united themselves for working towards the progress of their villages and families.
- ♦ Women grouped together in 21 Self Help Groups for durable and reliable families. Over 400 children have taken membership in various peace clubs.

#### 4.2. Youth for Peacebuilding: Training of peace volunteers in Northeast India

Working with conflict ridden communities and helping out in the rehabilitation process of those displaced, formation of peace clubs and peace communities in Chirang and Kokhrajhar Districts, FAsCE India has gained sufficient experience and inherited many good practices. So, it was decided to make it a regular process that will empower the weaker sections to uphold their Rights, lead a peaceful life and



solve their conflicts within their own communities. This vision guided FAsCE India to take the bold step of training the youth into peace building and conflict resolution skills and motivating them to utilize their strengths to form peace clubs in the villages and work towards sustainable CBOS, wherever FAsCE India has its presence.



To promote grassroots movement for peace and harmony in the seven states of Northeast India by building a network of youth willing to work for peace and harmony among all peoples, FAsCE India initiated the project, "Youth for peacebuilding."

Inaugurating the project, FAsCE India organised a three-day Training of Trainers (ToT) on 'Youth for Peacebuilding' at its head office from Jan 29 to Feb 1, 2015. It was the first of four such ToTs to follow during the year. We remain grateful to Mesen met een Missie, Netherlands, for their financial assistance in the endeavour.

#### Some excerpts from the sharing of the participants:

"I learned how to build peace and I want the same to share with the society where I live," said Mr. Mathew Barka, Bahalpur.

"The training opened my eyes unto various kinds of conflicts existing in the society, initiated me into the world of genuine harmony and instilled in me an ardent desire to be a channel of peace wherever I am," said Aker Pikyor, a participant from Tato.

"This training moulded me to face all the conflicts that may arise my life. I will strive to establish peace clubs in my village in order to maintain and keep common brotherhood and harmony," said Ms Mercy, a Participant from Jonai, Assam.

#### 5. PROMOTION OF HEALTH AND PROTECTION OF ENVIRONMENT

#### 5.1. Providing solar lanterns to Tea Garden labourers

FAsCE India, with the help of Raskob Foundation, distributed 352 solar lanterns to selected beneficiaries belonging to the Adivasi community working in the tea gardens of Bahalpur, Dhubri district, Assam. Twelve lanterns were provided to the six supplementary education centres run by FAsCE India as well, where 200 children from the same community study during evenings.

#### 5.2. Solar lamps for underprivileged children

Five hundred underprivileged children of Jonai Sub Division, Dhemaji District, Assam, were distributed with solar lamps on Nov 12, 2014, by FAsCE India in collaboration with Fransalian School, Jonai. Aimed at providing children from poor background with light to study and come up in life, the initiative was part of FAsCE India's objective of promoting non-conventional energy as well. The lamps were distributed by Mrs Monalisa Goswami IAS, the Deputy Commissioner, and Mr Maidu Mondal IPS, the Superintendent of Police, Dhemaji, during a public function held at Fransalian School, Jonai, prior to the children's day.

Speaking on the occasion, both the DC and SP appreciated FAsCE India and Fransalian School for the noble task of promoting the cause of the education of underprivileged children. The beneficiaries were chosen from among poor children of the area, who are members of Children's Parliament and lacked electricity at home





#### 6. COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

#### 6.1. CBR in 25 interior villages of Basar, Arunachal Pradesh

Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) of Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) is a project being implemented by FAsCE India since three years in collaboration with CBR Forum, Bangalore, in 25 interior villages around Basar, Arunachal Pradesh, with 261 PwDs and their families. It is heartening to note that the organisation's efforts towards mainstreaming PwDs is taking greater strides and bearing fruits as time pass by. Disabled People's Organisations (DPOs) have taken shape in the villages and they are accomplishing a lot in the form of bringing together PwDs, creating awareness among them regarding their rights, attaining disability certificates for them, etc.

The challenge that FAsCE India embraced three years back in mainstreaming the PwDs of 25 villages under Basar, West Siang district, Arunachal Pradesh, is making headway in the actualisation of planned activities and positively affecting the lives of the PwDs.

#### 6.2. Skill training for Persons with Disabilities

In association with Raskob Foundation, USA, FAsCE India trained 80 Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) in various skills and set them on the path of self employment at Basar, Arunachal Pradesh. The project was accomplished through the assistance of the Disabled People's Organisations (DPOs) formed by FAsCE India in the area to empower the PwDs in various ways. This livelihood project was suggested by DPOs and the selection of trainees, trainers and





them. The trades they were trained in, included candle making, rosary making, host making, artificial flower making and weaving traditional garments.

Around 300 SHG women gathered at the office premises to celebrate the day. Commemorating the day, a fruit tree was planted symbolically by Fr (Dr) Emmanuel Mappilaparambil (Director), Fr (Dr)



Emmanuel Uppamthadathil (Vice-President), Fr. Francis Thadathil (Former President), and one of the SHG members of FAsCE India, at the premises of FAsCE India Head Office. Over 400 saplings were distributed by the Dignitaries to the SHG Members, reminding them of their

FAsCE India Zonal Office, Bahalpur, too celebrated the World Environment Day with various programmes, making the people of the locality aware that a safe and healthy environment is essential for the living of future generations. smokeless choolas and solar lanterns was done, highlighting the need for curbing deforestation and promoting the use of nonconventional solar energy. At the end of the day, the participants were sure of one thing: 'Cleaner the Environment, better the Health'.

#### 7.3. International Youth Day 2014

FAsCE India joined hands with the rest of the world in celebrating the International Youth Day on Aug 12 at its head office in Guwahati by enlightening the youth on the theme, "Youth and mental health," through various games and group activities. It was oriented towards making the youth of the area aware of their worth and potential, and instil in them confidence to move forward courageously in accomplishing their rights. A total of 50 youth from 20 different Self Help Groups





in and around Narengi participated in the programme. The resource person of the day Fr John Barman, MSFS, the Fransalian youth director, well enunciated the theme, "Youth and mental health," through various games and group activities. In and through apt anecdotes and video clips, he explained to them how important the slogan of the day is, "Mental health matters," in their lives. Aimed at promoting youth-talent and enhancing their potential, prizes were awarded to the winners of various games and group activities.



#### 7.4. International Women's Day 2015

Fransalian Agency for Social Care and Education (FAsCE India) organised International Women's Day celebration on Sunday, March 8, 2015, at its head office in Narengi, Guwahati. Dr Akashitora Saikia, an eminent actress and social activist, honoured the podium as the Chief Guest and Mr Paresh Kalita, Councillor of the area, was the Guest of Honour. Around 300 women from 20 Self Help Groups of FAsCE India, across 10 villages around Narengi, Guwahati, along with their children participated in the celebration and exhibited their talents on the occasion. The major attraction of the day was the exhibition of SHG products and food festival. Each Self Help Group prepared varieties of traditional dishes and exhibited their IGP products. Two leading SHGs from among the 20 were awarded certificates, trophies and cash awards for their performance during the past year.



**Women's Day in a unique style:** Self Help Groups of FAsCE India in Thingba Khullen and Thingba Khounou villages, Senapati district, Manipur, celebrated International Women's Day by honouring the elder ladies of both villages with showers of appreciation and gifts. The SHGs celebrated the day on March 22, 2015, with the theme 'Empowering women, empowering society.' Fr Jojan Plathottathil, MSFS, Sr Arul Mary and local leaders enlightened the gathering with regard to the importance of the day, role of women in the society and their rights. All the women above 80 years of age were honoured with gifts. As part of the celebration, sports and cultural competitions were organised among women and the winners were given prizes.









International Women's Day celebration and formally launched a federation of Self Help Groups, under the banner Longai Valley Mahila Vikash Mancha, first in the patherkhandi sub-division, on March 25, at the local office. Over 300 women, members of various SHGs under FAsCE - Seva Kendra, attended the program. Various cultural programmes by different communities like - Ranglong, Chorei, Halam, Mog, Bengali and Manipuri added grandeur to the day.

#### 8. PLACEMENT OF MSW STUDENTS

Five MSW students from Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS), Guwahati, were placed on block fieldwork placement for a month from Oct 10 - Nov 10 with FAsCE India. Mr AbinashTalukdar, Ms

## 120 PwDs realize their first disability right



GUWAHATI, November 29: FASCE India, a Northeast India based NGO, organized a medical camp in Basar Division of West Siang district of Arunachal Pradesh in collaboration with the medical team of District Hospital Aalo. The camp was organized at SFS School Basar on 28 and 29 November. It was conducted by a team of expert doctors from the district hospital at Aalo

and CHC Basar, led by DMO of Aalo, Dr. Marbom Basar. Marjum Bam, the president of Basar Block Disabled Peoples organization (DPO), while welcoming everyone, highlighted the importance of the day. Speaking on the inaugural function, D. Apang, EAC of Basar, appreciated FASCE India for organizing such a noble and charitable act and exhorted everyone to make use of such beautiful opportunities and get the full favors of the camp.
